Tirohanga Whānui Overview

Ngāti Kurī led the Ngāi Tahu migration to Te Waipounamu and they established themselves at Kaikōura under their rangatira (chief), Marukaitātea.

There were other Ngāti Kurī rangatira living at Kaikōura. Among them were Te Rakiwhakaputa, Te Ruahikihiki and Makō.

They all supported Maru but as rangatira in their own right they were also keen to find their own place.

This korero tells of how and why they established kainga for their people who are still there to this day.

Aronga / Focus

Me tiro whakamuri kia anga whakamua

- Understand how land was claimed through tapatapawhenua
- Learning about Māori histories and narratives – Ngāi Tahu kōrero, Ngāi Tahu Pūrākau
- Explore local korero and ways they can be retold
- Develop and strengthen Te Reo Māori
- Research Māori tribal leaders and their kāinga. Find out how kāinga are established and where
- Research and explain mahinga kai and its importance to establishing settlements

l mua / Before

- Discuss and become familiar with the vocabulary within the animation. Flash cards activity
- Explain that this story is related to Ngāi Tahu, talk about what hapū are
- Locate where Kaikoura is on a map, locate the other significant places from the animation
- Identify if any students have whakapapa to Ngāti Wheke, Ngāti Moki, Ngāti Makō, Ngāi Tahu Who has been to Orariki? Rāpaki? Wairewa? Mokomoko? Ōtākou? Peketā?
- Discussion: Who has been diving? Who has eaten tuna, pioke, pātiki, ika etc. Who is the mahinga kai person/ people in their whānau? What is mahinga kai?
- What are the differences between a swamp, lake , harbour and river?

l waenga / During

- Watch the full animation once
- Second time through, stop the animation at short intervals to discuss: who, what, where, when, why and how
- Discuss the main characters and their roles
- List any pātai tamariki have
- Record key vocabulary from the animation
- Complete the 'konohi kainukere' scavenger hunt activity
- While watching, think about how you could convince others to reside with you at your kainga. What are the benefits?
- Spot the mōkihi. Do you know how it is made? What it was/is used for?

l muri / After

- Visit Ngāi Tahu websites to find more relevant information
- Research other Māori Iwi stories, compare and contrast
- Inquiry (Think, Create, Share)
- Complete the cloze activity for comprehension
- Create a class Quizlet and/or Kahoot based on this story, key concepts and vocabulary
- Create a model of a kāinga, digital, 3D or draw a picture
- Complete the whakaropū / classification activity
- Where would you choose to establish a kāinga? What would be the kai source? Why would that place be suitable for your whānau? What draws you there?

- Sequence the korero
- Colouring in sheets
- Place names and the names and roles of significant people from the story
- Significant places and people in Māori history
- Create Stop Animations and i-movies
- Online books that retell the story in the students' own words
- Double print copies of the images and play memory, snap or fish
- Learn the pepeha of Wairewa, Rāpaki and Taumutu (Ngāi Tahu Pepeha)
- Rewrite the story into your own words
- Online books
- Tito waiata write a waiata about this story
- Create a physical or virtual map of the area where this story is located
- · Create an i-movie to retain and share the korero

- Design and make a board game
- Pretend you could interview the rangatira. What would you ask?
- Interview a mahinga kai expert
- Create a map that shows all of the significant places in this story (Kā Huru Manu)
- Write songs, poems etc that identify the main events within this story
- Write a play, re-enact, perform this story to others
- Create physical art pieces, e.g., paint, crayon, sculptures of scenes from the story
- EOTC: Haerenga/class trip to visit the physical sites
- Taupatupatu different perspectives
- Using Minecraft, design your kāinga
- Design challenge. Make a mokihi. Float it at the lake or river
- Research and present information on these rangatira (Marukaitātea, Makō, Te Ruahikihiki, Te Rakiwhakaputa)


