1	Raukawakawa	A	Ngāti Kurī lived here alongside Ngāti Kahungunu and other iwi. Ngāti Kurī left here to move to Te Waipounamu in search of a new home.
2	Kura Te Au	В	Places in the far south of Te Waipounamu where Waitai and his followers moved to when they left their pā.
3	Kaihinu Pā	С	An island located on a peninsula at the top of Te Waipounamu. This island is part of the Kaihinu Pā where Ngāti Kurī first settled when they moved to Te Waipounamu.
4	Te Waipounamu	D	The Ngāti Kurī settlement established at Kura te Au when Ngāti Kuri first crossed over from Te Whanganui-a-Tara to Te Waipounamu. This pā was on the peninsula with an island called Mōioio.
5	Te Whanganui-a-Tara	E	The entrance to the Tory Channel at the top of Te Waipounamu.
6	Mōioio	F	The traditional name for the South Island, which translates as the waters of greenstone.
7	Ōtākou & Murihiku	G	The body of water that separates Te Ika-a-Māui and Te Waipounamu. Also known as the Cook Strait.
