

Te Huataki - Board Game

What you will need:

- 2 or 3 players, as individuals or in small groups
- An object to represent your waka (a counter or small rock)
- A reader: someone to read the pātai/questions
- The game board and question cards

Aim:

First player/s to arrive on land wins

How to play:

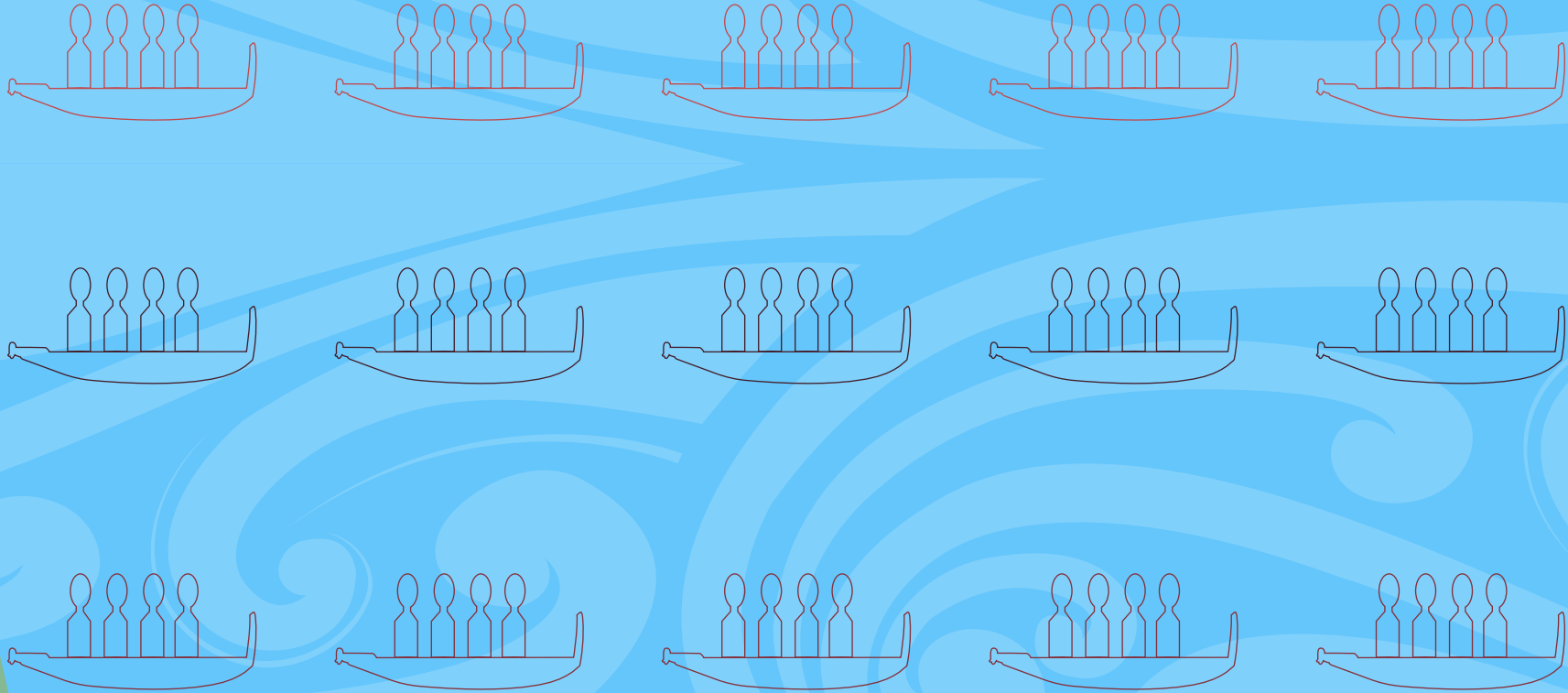
1. Play individually or in small groups.
2. Objective: Get your waka from one shore to the other (choose to start at Te Whanganui-a-Tara or Te Waipounamu).
3. The Reader reads a card aloud to the teams.
4. The first team to answer correctly moves forward one space.
5. Incorrect answers move that team back one space.
6. Beware of changing winds! If the wind changes, the player/s that answer the next question correctly can choose another waka to send back to shore.
